What a fabulous year we have had

What a fabulous year we had in 2022. In some ways it felt like we were butterflies unfurling from our COVID-cocoons and exploring outside our confined space once again. 


Meet the Author

The AOGU started a new event this year to celebrate and profile our members who are authors. We commend these events to you as a chance to understand what it takes to not only write a book, but to be published. These events were attended by Old Girls and current parents.

Kate Forsyth (1984) generously gave of her time in June to share how she became an author and her creative process. She even shared her first published piece from The Weaver! We were treated to a delightful peek at Kate's notebooks where she writes copious notes to develop her characters and stories. They were true works of art. Kate's writing spans historical fiction, young adult/children and non-fiction, and her latest book, The Crimson Thread, is a reimagining of 'The Minotaur in the Labyrinth' myth set in Crete during the Nazi invasion and occupation of World War II.

Nicole Alexander (1983) spoke to us in September. We started by having a laugh at some photos of Nicole and her friends during her school days, before Nicole shared her writing journey. She came to writing late when moving back to her family property and being inspired by the land and the people. Nicole diligently researches people, places and history to bring together her interwoven stories based on Australian life and times. Nicole has published 11 historical fiction novels, as well as poetry, travel and genealogy articles and her latest book, The Last Station, set on the Darling River during the dying days of the paddle steamer.

Helen shared the obstacles girls faced in being able to access an education beyond the primary years. The school has an adjacent sewing school, which trains the girls who are not academic with an employable skill. We are proud that we were able to contribute funding for one of the students, Mary Masanja, to attend two years at Bunda Girls Secondary School.

Grace Pattison (2013), founder of School Girl Essentials (SGE) along with Zion Issangya, described the challenges that face girls once they start their menses, with girls skipping school during their period

2021 and 2022 Centenary Scholars

Congratulations to AOGU Centenary Scholarship recipients for the last two years.

Jasmine Burton was awarded the 2021 AOGU Centenary Scholarship at the Year 11 Prize Giving Assembly in December last year. Maya Khanna-Boyle was awarded the 2022 AOGU Centenary Scholarship at the Birthday Assembly on 23 July this year, the first time the scholarship could be awarded in front of the whole School since 2019. The Centenary Scholarship was inaugurated by the AOGU in 1985 to commemorate Abbotsleigh's Centenary Year. It is awarded annually to a Year 11 girl (whose mother is an Old Girl) who by her effort and enthusiasm, participates in a broad spectrum of the School's curriculum and community activities.

All the girls who interviewed for the scholarship were outstanding, with a diverse range of interests and strong contributions to School and the broader community.


Kiana Elliott (2014) finished fourth in the 71kg weightlifting event at the Commonwealth Games held in Birmingham.



Change to the Enrolment Policy affecting daughters of Abbotsleigh Old Girls

It is no longer necessary for the daughter of an Abbotsleigh Old Girl to attend entrance testing for her entry to Year 5 or Year 7. We value your connection with the School and would like to assist with ensuring that your daughter attends Abbotsleigh, as you did. Accepted places are offered to daughters of Abbotsleigh Old Girls entering at ALL entry points on early application. Abbotsleigh Old Girls are strongly encouraged to make application soon after the birth of their daughter to best ensure a place at Abbotsleigh. After 12 months of age, places are offered to those girls on the waiting list and while we will always try to assist with progressing enrolment for the daughter of an Old Girl, it will become more difficult to guarantee a place. The entry points for Junior School are Transition, Kindergarten, Year 3 and Year 5. The entry point for Senior School is Year 7. Please contact me should you wish to discuss any aspect of this process. I look forward to welcoming your daughter to Abbotsleigh.
