

110th Anniversary Grant Winners for 2019

The 110th Anniversary Grant was established in 2018 to commemorate the 110th anniversary of the Abbotsleigh Old Girls' Union (AOGU). The aim of the Grant is to support Old Girls in meaningful endeavours to benefit the community or have a positive social impact. The Grant recognises the value Old Girls add by being contributory members to their local and/or world-wide communities through financial assistance and raising awareness of their activities.

The Anniversary Grants Sub-committee really enjoyed reviewing the very high calibre applications in a range of different projects and it was a privilege to hear how many Old Girls are giving back to the community. It is a shame that we cannot award a Grant to all the applicants. However, it is a pleasure to share details of the three winners for 2019 as follows:

REBECCA LADD (1981)

This Grant will assist Rebecca in providing professional development opportunities for two teachers and interpreters from the Wangsel Institute of the Deaf in Bhutan. We are so proud to hear of the great work she is doing to improve education for deaf students in Bhutan. We were shocked to discover that school education for deaf children in Bhutan only commenced in 2003. Teacher education is badly needed in order to better support these children and as such, we are very pleased to be supporting this project. We look forward to providing you a further update as Rebecca's project develops.



HELEN HOSKIN (1969)

Helen has been doing amazing work in setting up the Bunda Girls Secondary School in Tanzania. This Grant will provide a two-year scholarship for an academically gifted girl to attend the Bunda Girls Secondary School. Without the scholarship, this girl would not be able to study at this school and most likely would not continue her education at all. At Abbotsleigh, we pride ourselves in empowering young women and value the importance of education. Through education, we can help transform the life of a young woman, her family and their village.

Mary Masanja (pictured) has now been selected as the scholarship recipient and commenced Form One (Year 7) at the beginning of this year. She has been selected as an able student from a poor background from the local primary schools surrounding Bunda Girls Secondary School. Mary hopes to be a doctor when she leaves school, so this is a dream come true and she is very excited to have this opportunity.

On behalf of Mary and her family, headmistress Deninsia and all the staff of BGSS, Helen sends her heartfelt thanks. If anyone is interested in further supporting Helen's project, please contact the Old Girls Office.

GILLIAN TRUMAN (1999)

Many of you may know Gill and the group of nine Abbotsleigh girls who set up the charity MotorOn in 2015 to support those with motor neuron disease (MND). Gill herself has been diagnosed with MND, yet her focus is on helping others suffering from the disease. The money from this Grant has been donated to the Macquarie University MND Research Centre, Australia's largest MND research facility and in particular, to support the purchase of a Neurotrack module. This is a microscope that can assess new drugs for neuroprotection and neurorepair for MND. We very much hope that through the continued research by Macquarie University MND Research Centre, a cure for this terrible disease can be found soon.

Congratulations to our three winners!! Could you be the recipient for the 110th Anniversary Grant for 2020? Applications will be opening in July.

Boarder Drought Relief Fund

We are all very aware of the impact of the drought and terrible bushfires on Australian rural and regional communities. In particular, the AOGU recognises the effect on a number of our boarding families, many of whom are long-standing Abbotsleigh families. Scholarships Now Available for Girls in Years 9 and 10

The following scholarship opportunities are available for current Year 9 and Year 10 girls:

- Foundation Scholarship Year 10 2021
- The Royle Scholarship Year 10 or Year 11 2021
- The Kathleen McCredie Award Year 10 2021

These scholarships are now open and have a closing date of Friday 15 May.

The Foundation Scholarship is now open to new and current Abbotsleigh students in Year 9 2020.

The Foundation Scholarship is a needs-based academic scholarship which commence at Year 10 level and provide up to 50% remission of school tuition fees for the remainder of schooling. Consideration is given to academic attainment, general interest and ability and participation in other activities, for example, service and community activities, music, drama and sport.

Two Foundation Scholarships are awarded.

The Royle Scholarship is open to new and current Abbotsleigh students in Year 9 2020 or Year 10 2020.

The Royle Scholarship is an academic and/or general merit scholarship providing up to 50% remission of school tuition fees for the remainder of schooling. Needs-based criteria may also apply.

It is awarded to a girl who is the daughter, granddaughter or great granddaughter of an Abbotsleigh Old Girl.

One Royle Scholarship is awarded.

The Kathleen McCredie Award is open to new and current Abbotsleigh students in Year 9 2020.

The Kathleen McCredie Award was created in perpetuity to honour Old Girl Miss Kathleen McCredie, Headmistress of Abbotsleigh 1970-1987.

The Kathleen McCredie Award is for a student who demonstrates significant all round involvement in the areas of spirituality, service, culture, sport and academia. This is a needs based scholarship with strict financial criteria.

One Kathleen McCredie Scholarship is awarded.

Change to the Enrolment Policy affecting daughters of Abbotsleigh Old Girls

I am delighted to communicate a change to the Enrolment Policy affecting the daughter of an Abbotsleigh Old Girl. We value your connection with the School and would like to assist with ensuring that your daughter attends Abbotsleigh, as you did.

It will no longer be necessary for the daughter of an Abbotsleigh Old Girl to attend entrance testing for her entry to Year 5 or Year 7. Accepted places are offered to daughters of Abbotsleigh Old Girls entering at ALL entry points on early application. Abbotsleigh Old Girls are strongly encouraged to make application soon after the birth of their daughter to best ensure a place at Abbotsleigh. After 12 months of age, places are offered to those girls on the waiting list and while we will always try to assist with progressing enrolment for the daughter of an Old Girl, it will become more difficult to guarantee a place.

The entry points for Junior School are Transition, Kindergarten, Year 3 and Year 5. The entry point for Senior School is Year 7.

Please <u>contact</u> me should you wish to discuss any aspect of this process.

I look forward to welcoming your daughter to Abbotsleigh.

When an Abbotsleigh girl walks out the front gates for the final time and takes her first step into her new journey as an Old Girl, she can't help but leave a little piece of herself behind.


The School has a special way to recognise these special 'steps of time'.
