Welcome to Term 4. In true Abbotsleigh style, with orientation days for the Junior School and Year 7 2024 in the Senior School, a Year 7 2024 boarding sleepover, and the HSC examinations starting on Wedesday, it really has been an action-packed start to term.

We certainly wish our Year 12 girls every success in their HSC examinations. The girls have worked extremely hard and we know that each girl will be striving to do her personal best in all her exams. We are incredibly proud of each and every one of our Year 12 girls - they are resilient and confident young women who will take the challenge of the exams in their stride.

This week in assembly we recognised the International Day of the Girl Child, a day dedicated to recognising and promoting the rights and wellbeing of girls worldwide. Emphasising the importance of empowering girls through education, access to healthcare, and protection from violence and discrimination, this day also encourages girls to dream big, pursue their goals, and contribute to building a more equitable and just world. We recognised how fortunate we are to be at Abbotsleigh, a school that has been empowering young women since 1885 and the importance of looking outward and considering girls globally. In doing so it certainly highlights that we have so much to be grateful to God for in our lives. In her devotion, Lily Thornthwaite (Head Prefect 2023/24) reminded the girls of the importance to fill their minds with things that are

blessings, "whatever is good, praiseworthy, true, noble, right, pure, lovely, honourable" and give gratitude to God for them.

I spoke with the girls about the simple activity that I call "hunt the good stuff" focusing on these blessings. The benefits of this are enormous and research shows it has a positive impact on an individual's wellbeing and builds optimism and resilience over time if done regularly. I challenged the girls to take time out in their day to record three good things each day (big or small) and with each reflect on:

- · Why did this good thing happen?
- · What does this good thing mean to me?
- · What could I do to enable more of this good thing?
- · How did I or others contributed to these good things?

I would encourage all families to spend just a few moments each evening 'hunting the good stuff'. This can be done as the girls go to bed or shared with the family around the dinner table. Over time you will begin to notice a pattern and you may be surprised just how good you will feel.

The challenge and excitement of all things new

This week we have been orientating more than 100 new students who are becoming Abbotsleigh Junior School girls in 2024. Additionally, we have our entire Year 6 cohort involved in 'O Week' up in the Senior School and out climbing high ropes and orienteering. New beginnings are exciting times. Yet for some of us, the thought and anticipation of 'new', can result in rising anxiety, stress and manifest as tears and sometimes tantrums.

The challenge for the caring adults in this equation is how to ensure that experiences are challenging and exciting without being fear riddled.

Much of what is needed in creating a successful experience is the preparation that happens surrounding the event. When children and their parents are well informed as to what to expect throughout the process, through the sharing of positive social stories and exciting program details, we know that many anxious thoughts are able to be well managed.

For the child who is worried about whether or not she will make friends, I reassure in the meeting prior to orientation that the Abbotsleigh girls are remarkably friendly and very keen to make new friends. I also explain that if she has good friends at her current school, then she will surely bring these great friendship skills to Abbotsleigh. Such skills are not magic, but tangible and will stand her in great stead as she seeks to establish warm and supportive friendships here. Girls entering Primary readily agree that they won't forget how to read as they come to Abbotsleigh, so I encourage them to also believe that they won't forget how to make





friends either, especially, as these are predicated by evident social skills.

Equally important is that the experiences surrounding new beginnings are carefully scaffolded and timed to be developmentally appropriate. For our girls entering Transition and Kindergarten, visits to the School with parents initially, then for a half day of orientation with parents and then for a half day independently as a 'play morning', all set the scene for success. For older girls, a full day of orientation is feasible and manageable. For our Year 6 girls, the process is extended to exploring the much larger world of Senior School. The final day of orientation in Term 1 is designed to ensure that the parents are confident of routines. Relaxed and informed parents are well placed to support and alleviate any jitters their daughter may have as she commences.

The final piece in this equation is the role of the wise and experienced adults. This includes both educators and parents. With information, we can be well informed of processes and confident of our role in encouraging,

supporting and showing faith and optimism in each child's ability to navigate new settings. As the caring adults, we must acknowledge that it is fine to be a little anxious and have a few butterflies in the tummy prior to tackling something new. Adrenalin in such situations is actually healthy and useful to ensuring that we are well primed and focused to meet the new challenge. It is the act of conquering such perceived fears that gives us a reservoir of experience to meet the next more demanding challenge with confidence and anticipation of success.

Our role extends beyond simply preparing for the experience so that the greatest learning is possible. We are also often needed after the event to assist the child to reflect on the experience to crystallise the learning that has taken place. Yet, during the learning we need to stand back with the mantra: 'never do for a child that which they can do for themselves'. To do so sends the message that we see them as capable learners with the grit, persistence and problem-solving capabilities necessary to thrive.

Whatever the scenario, not knowing, living with ambiguity and managing the associated emotions is not easy. Yet these are essential life skills for our girls growing up in a world that is increasingly more complex and less predictable. Let's start this learning early so our girls excel in this domain too.

The Everett Scholarships were first offered in 2000 following a gift from Mrs Shirley Fong (AOG Shirley Lee,1951) to honour Miss G Gordon Everett, a great Headmistress whose care and assistance inspired Shirley Fong and the many other young women who came under her guidance. Between 2000 and 2017, the scholarships were offered annually to two girls providing remission of one term's tuition fees in Year 10. From 2017, following an agreement with Mrs Fong, one scholarship is offered annually providing remission of two terms' fees in Year 10. The funds for this scholarship are managed by the Abbotsleigh Foundation.

One scholarship is available annually to a Year 9 Abbotsleigh student moving from Year 9 to Year 10. The scholarship gives special recognition to a student's sound academic progress, contribution to Senior College activities and a positive influence within the Senior School.

The scholarship provides two terms' tuition fees for the first two terms of Year 10. The scholarship is not means tested. No student may hold two Abbotsleigh Scholarships concurrently.
