Dusted Off

Last Wednesday, Year 10 had the opportunity to attend Dusted Off, a one-man show by actor, musician and singer/ songwriter Brett Hunt. Tying into our studies in the history of Australia's involvement in the Vietnam war, Brett brought to the stage the moving story of his family and his Vietnam war veteran father, Private Frank Hunt – the eponymous Frankie who kicked a mine the day that mankind kicked the moon, as described in Redgum's iconic song, 'I was only 19'.

We were all captivated as Brett skilfully used song and storytelling to recount his family's experiences of the Vietnam war: how his parents met, his father's enlistment into the war aged 19, the minefield in Vietnam that left him removing shrapnel for the rest of his life, and the unwelcome circumstances that awaited returning veterans back home.

The stories were infused with music that Brett had composed, accompanied by atmospheric sound effects and his amazing embodiment of different characters. In particular, vivid scenes of conflict during his father's service were brought to life through innovative uses of the guitar to evoke the physical and emotional environment of a scene. Two standout examples of this were the recreation of the helicopter's rotor as it evacuated his father from the minefield, and the



echo effect used to convey the fear and tension experienced in the Vietnam jungle. It was truly astounding watching him seamlessly transition between narration, song and sound effects, and many of us shed a few tears at certain points of the 70-minute incursion.

Brett did brilliantly in engaging us in a difficult and sobering story, achieving the perfect balance between performance and remembrance in the discussion of unfathomable events. His raw honesty in passing on the legacy of his father, and all war veterans, served as a powerful reminder of the duty we all hold in recognising and commemorating a significant part of Australia's history.

The importance of direction

A recent investigative report by researchers at the University of Derby has concluded that careers guidance is a powerful tool that can make a huge difference to how people think about and plan their future. The goal of successful careers guidance is that candidates will be able to build happy, purposeful and successful lives, whether it is through their educational choices, their work preferences, voluntary work they choose to undertake or their role in caring for family. It can assist them to integrate their talents and interests so they can source meaningful work, while having the fulfilment of giving back to their community.

We aim that our students leave school with some positive goals in mind, yet armed with the knowledge that a career pathway is rarely linear and that there will be lots of twists and turns along the way. This is because they are likely to discover new interests and directions, that better suit their current circumstances as they move through life. They do not need to leave school with a 'passion', but merely to have a notion of what sort of thing might bring satisfaction and meaning to their lives. As students leave school, they need to be clear in their mind that there is no one course, university or career path that is the only one capable of bringing them all they hope for.

Many universities offer similar courses, and it is a folly to think that you will only get a good job if you focus on a course at one particular university. How do you think other courses and universities continue to flourish if their graduates do not get employed? There are universal standards set for every tertiary course across Australia to ensure that students have equal employability prospects on graduation. Being a flexible and adaptable thinker is one of the most sought-after traits amongst modern employers, and so it is important for our girls to leave school with an open mind and a thirst for life-long learning, in their quest for a satisfying career path.
