The Royal Flying Doctor Service: Sophia Darney

I would like to speak on behalf of the Abbotsleigh boarding community about our continuing official and long-standing affiliation with the Royal Flying Doctor Service.

The organisation aims to provide lifesaving emergency health care services across rural Australia.

Many people in remote Australia live on stations, some are hours away from any major town. Isolation means that it is difficult to access medical treatment, so they rely on the RFDS to help when they are faced with an illness or even a life-threatening emergency.

Many of our boarders come from rural and remote areas, so it is important as a school to help a foundation that has personal meaning to several individuals across our broader community.

We aim to support this through awareness and fundraising events within Abbotsleigh. The money that will be raised through these events will be donated to the RFDS, in a combined display of support for such a remarkable cause.

The funds raised go such a long way, from popup clinics within communities lacking these facilities, to aeromedical retrieval in critical emergency situations where there is limited to no access to local hospitals, and

mental health services that are crucial in our most remote parts of Australia.

We would love our school community to become conscious of the importance of the RFDS and contribute to fundraising events in the near future.

'As many of us come from smaller towns, a big high school like Abbotsleigh, being so far away from home with so many strange faces, can be really scary for a new boarder. Rita Tyrrel – I'm Rita, I'm from Cairns and I'm in Year 7.

Nell Owen – I'm Nell, I'm from the Snowy Mountains and I'm in Year 11.

Annie Knight – I'm Annie, I'm from Cootamundra and I'm in Year 7.

Mia, can you share a time when you felt disconnected or homesick from your family while boarding and how did you overcome those feelings? (Willa McKay, Year 11)

Mia – At the end of my first term at Abbotsleigh, my mum moved to New York and it was a big change for me. I really missed my family, and Charlie was really supportive of me. She's always been very approachable and has really made me feel at home every single day of school.

Annie, what has your Big Sister done to support you through your first chapters of high school and boarding school? (Willa McKay, Year 11)

Annie – Nell has taken me down the street, and she's very kind to me. She always asks if I need anything and offers to help me whether it be with schoolwork or adjusting to being away from my family.

Rita, what's your favourite memory of an experience with your big sister? (Willa McKay)

Rita – On the way back from Raging Waters, Myffy made sure I was fitting in well to Abbotsleigh being a boarder. She told me things I would need to know before coming to school and told me some of her favourite parts of boarding.

Charlie, how has being a Big Sister impacted your senior years? (Demelza Lee, Year 11)

Charlie – Being a Big Sister to Mia since the start of last year has made me feel more a part of the boarding

community and I feel like I have really helped her adjust to boarding life.

Nell, what are the benefits of being a Big Sister? (Demelza Lee)

Nell – Being Annie's Big Sister, I get to be a part of her life. I love just going and talking to her, taking her to the village and helping her with anything she needs. I'm so excited to get to spend the next year and a half spending time with Annie.

Myffy, what are some activities you do as a Big Sister? (Demelza Lee)

Myffy – To start off our year we are put in groups with our buddies for the boarder fun day, and then we have dinners with our Little Sisters throughout the year. We play games and celebrate different holidays like Valentine's Day and Christmas. We make each other presents and write notes to each other. We also go visit the Year 7 boarding house and hang out with everyone there.

National Boarding Week has reminded us of the joys of boarding and living together in a community.
