The Drawn to Word exhibition is a wonderful showcase of the illustrator's contribution to the art of storytelling. The exhibition captures something of the richness of creative and imaginative art work in illustrations and images which may accompany poetry, humorous fiction, non-fiction and the media. The illustrators represented here show how powerfully their creativity can make meaning, and either inform the written word or replace the written text entirely.

As an adjunct to our Abbotsleigh Literary Festival, the exhibition celebrates the works of a wonderful range of illustrators, cartoonists and animated film makers. One of the many contributors is Cathy Wilcox, an Abbotsleigh Old Girl who completed her HSC in 1980. As a book illustrator and Sydney Morning Herald cartoonist, she has received many accolades including three Stanley Awards for cartooning and a Walkley Award in 2007 for her contribution to Journalism. Her work, and the work of others in our exhibition, reminds us that illustrations are not always secondary to text but are often centre stage. Such illustrations can provide the viewer with new perspectives from which to consider ideologies and philosophies.

I have the privilege of currently teaching Year 7 English and wonder if any of them will be part of exhibitions in the future. We have recently been studying picture books and I asked them each to bring in their favourite picture book from their childhood. We spent time talking about what these precious texts meant to them and how the images and text work together to make meaning. Are the books important to them because they remind them of time spent snuggling up with a loved one discovering the joy of reading? Are they special because the pictures are evocative of other worlds and imaginative flights of fancy? Is their value connected to the depth of meaning which the pictures bring to the written text? Do they love the book simply because it is aesthetically beautiful? As we shared our memories and our ideas it was very clear that the answers to all were a resounding yes.

We live in a visual age and the students taught today at Abbotsleigh are among a generation who are more visually literate than the generations that preceded them. They understand the power of image and the many and varied ways in which image and text can inform meaning. Although illustrations in fiction were a common and popular feature of nineteenth century literature, our twenty first century has taken the use of image to a new level. The absence of word, the inclusion of image and the logic of the visual is an ever evolving, sophisticated and powerful art form.

Art in varying forms enhances the depth of our appreciation and understanding. I am sure you will enjoy the breadth and depth of this exhibition, and like me, you will be delighted to see images and cartoons which bring back memories, challenge your thinking or simply invite joy.

Sara is an author and illustrator whose first picture book Ben and Duck won the Children's Book Council of Australia Crichton Award for new illustrators. She has always loved drawing, especially people and other strange creatures like an unexpected crocodile. Sara's watercolour images reveal her fine attention to detail as she interprets the author's words. Her humour brings each story alive, often through expression and subtle facial features. Her watercolours are lightly painted and retain a delicacy even when she is concentrating on the idea of rich colour. Sara was born in the Cotswolds in England, but now lives in Australia. In England she studied BA Hons Fine Art and a Postgraduate Diploma in Art Education at Goldsmiths in London and for many years taught art. 


Bronwyn Bancroft

Cockatoo and galah




Bronwyn Bancroft is a descendant of the Djanbun clan of the Bundjalung nation and a founding member of the Boomali Aboriginal Arts Cooperative, one of Australia's oldest Indigenous run organisations. In 2012 Bronwyn was honoured at Passion, Power, Politics, a solo retrospective exhibition at Sydney's Carriageworks, that spanned her entire 30 year career. Bronwyn is well known for her fabric designs, her work in the fashion and textile industry, public art commissions and her book illustrations. The paintings of native animals for Kangaroo and Crocodile reveal her beautiful use of rich gouache paint, her bold patterns and her choice of deeply saturated colour. Bronwyn's artworks reveal her commitment to aboriginal art and culture.

Freya Blackwood

Look a Book



Freya Blackwood was encouraged to draw from a young age and produced many illustrated books as a child. In 2010 Freya was awarded the UK Kate Greenaway Medal for Harry & Hopper, the story of a little boy coming to terms with the death of his dog. Freya works with a variety of techniques to achieve her desired result. She says, 'The more drawing I do, the more I appreciate the skill involved in drawing expressively and fluidly.' A technique that helps her maintain this freshness is to print her rough drawings on to water colour paper. This allows the pencil lines to remain bold and the watercolour to be freely applied on top. Drawn to Word includes illustrations from six books illustrated by Freya. Freya lives and works in Orange, a place that surrounds her with family and provides visual stimulus for her many books.

Sarah was born in London and spent her childhood in America, Sweden, and finally New Zealand. She has an honours degree in literature and taught English, creative writing and art in secondary schools in New Zealand before moving to Sydney in 2004, where she began freelancing as an illustrator for advertising, film, editorial publishing, and toy design. In her quest to find the right visual qualities for an author's text Sarah experiments with a great range of different art forms. Fearless is sketched lightly in pencil, layered with washes of ink and acrylic paint and finished off with Prismacolor pencils. In Sounds Spooky she made sculptures of all the characters and built an entire haunted house out of cardboard and plaster. She then photographed the scenes and used digital technology to refine the images. Sarah developed a technique that forced her to be less precise with Toucan can as she wanted a joyful colourful style for the book. She hand painted tissue paper and created rough tissue paper collage placing linework over the top.

Rocco is a graduate of the South Australian School of Art. For many years he has been a Fairfax Media illustrator and his drawings can be regularly seen in the Sydney Morning Herald, Sunday Age and the Sun-Herald. As a media illustrator working in a newsroom, Rocco is required to work to a daily deadline and says he may be required to produce drawings within an hour. His record is about eight in one day. In recent years he has been taking on the digital challenge using multimedia to create animations which have a strong bind to traditional newspaper cartoons. He says that storytellers in this digital age 'have to be fast, edgy, entertaining and informative but most of all, visually seductive.' Rocco is drawn to create stories on his digital tablet using a home-made stylus, he calls them 'espresso video animations.' Rocco is also a painter, represented by Maunsell Wickes Gallery, Paddington.

Kim studied to be a teacher and worked in a variety of different occupations before he began to illustrate stories for children at the age of 36. His first assignment was for the School Magazine, where he met Anna Fienberg, with whom he has since produced more than twenty books, including The Magnificent Nose and Other Marvels, which won the Children's Book Council of Australia Book of the Year for Younger Readers Award, the Tashi books, the Minton series and Joseph. Kim is also widely known for his best-selling 'how to' books, You Can Draw Anything and You Can Do Great Lettering. Kim draws in pencil and paints in watercolour and oil and is widely known and loved for his engaging talks where his hands on approach, creating magnificent pictures with pastels as he goes, has inspired numerous students and teachers.


The picture books that Gus enjoyed the most were those that had many layers of magic secretly happening in between the visual and textual, and to him this made the whole book more interesting. After leaving school he worked on cattle stations all over Australia before deciding to pursue a drawing career. He moved to Sydney and studied at the Julian Ashton Art School. In 1996 Gus illustrated his first children's book and now he has the opportunity to write his own magic. Gus's writing is always anthropomorphic, animals take the place of humans in the narrative and he attributes this to his love of Kenneth Grahame's Wind in The Willows. Gus takes great pleasure in the challenge of matching animals with appropriate and believable human character traits and guirks. Herman and Rosie is the story of a crocodile and a deer who live in New York as neighboring strangers. It is a story about music, connection and a shared love of jazz, which eventually helps bring them together.

David is a Murwillumbah based illustrator and manga artist who studied drawing at the Julian Ashton Art School Sydney and also Queensland College of Art, Brisbane. He has created concept art for film and TV including Steven Spielberg's World War II mini-series The Pacific. David is a keen teacher of comic and manga story and art skills, expressive 3D figure drawing and painting, drawing on both sides of the brain and digital art techniques for artists. David is working on his own graphic novel, Daruma, about ninjas, geishas and robots. David says he is passionate about restoring thorough drawing training to its rightful place alongside literacy and numeracy and about exploring the secrets of the ancient East and refining the secrets of the ancient West. David has a surprising talent for drawing with both hands at once and he feels this creates a balance in his mind.

Cathy attended Abbotsleigh, studied at Sydney College of the Arts and lived in Paris. After returning to Sydney in 1987 Cathy began illustrating children's books. She became a cartoonist for the for The Sydney Morning Herald and The Age newspapers and has published two collections of her cartoons. This year Cathy was invited back to France to join a group of international cartoonists, from all from five continents, to discuss globalisation and the resulting tensions from local perspectives. Her work as a cartoonist requires her to consider challenging world events as well as the domestic political scene. Her wit, great observation and drawing skill are evident in her book and news media illustrations. Cathy has twice won the Australian Children's Book Council's Picture Book of the Year award and twice won the Walkley Award in Cartooning.
