Bega kwa Bega: Our Girls Brave the Waves as they stand 'shoulder to shoulder' with girls in Tanzania

It was an absolute delight to attend a very special gathering on Monday evening where a number of courageous Abbotsleigh pioneers cooked beautiful African food for their parents and spoke about the incredible experiences they had 'braving many waves' in Tanzania for two weeks in July.

As the first Abbotsleigh school group to visit our partner schools – Bunda Girls' Secondary School (BGSS) and The School of St Jude in Tanzania, our girls, led by our dedicated staff members, Dr Alison Gates, Mrs Annette Ware and Rev Sarah Hobba were indeed pioneers – they were also superb representatives of our school.

The girls certainly gave of themselves and they definitely learnt a great deal; indeed, their experiences were life changing, as they were for the Bunda girls, with whom our girls and staff stayed for a week. Living in the newly built guest house, our girls attended lessons and chapel with the Bunda girls, shared meals and played games, and as such, forged very strong connections with their Bunda 'sisters'. It was fantastic for our girls to meet



Ntoji, Happyness, Elizabeth and Agness, especially, as these are the girls we have all heard about, seen pictures of, and who our Year 7 and 8 girls sponsor, write letters to, and receive letters from.

As AOG Rev Helen Hoskins (1969) who established BGSS said: ... "It was lovely to watch the progress through the week as the Abbotsleigh girls and Bunda girls really got to know one another and to share together in the classroom and other activities in such a beautiful way. This was especially evident in the relationship and sharing with the four girls sponsored by Abbotsleigh. On the first day they were so timid when we invited them into the guest house to meet everyone. By the end they were totally relaxed and relating so well.

... I think the girls' journals and devotion time were highlights for me. The girls were all beautiful in their joy to be with our girls and to experience new things. It was our first time to use the guest house and there are some improvements we will make for the future – fans in the bedrooms, we still need more cupboards and shelves, but on the whole, it worked amazingly well.

... I was also very happy we were able to include a visit to the Shalom Pre and Primary School (SPPS) and the Girls Brigade Sewing Centre. My dream for the future is that Abbotsleigh Junior School might form a partnership with SPPS. It could start with sponsoring some students. I'm looking forward to the time when SPPS graduates will be able to continue on to Bunda Girls' Secondary School and would love to have some specific sponsorships for that. This year is our first graduating class from SPPS."

With her obvious courage, passion and dedication, Rev Helen Hoskins has inspired our girls on many



occasions; indeed, their admiration and gratitude is represented beautifully by Eleanor Zhu (Year 10) below. Our senior girls are committed to continuing to support BGSS which is 'a happy and safe environment for students to live and learn – a place where they can focus on their studies to help them achieve a brighter future.

Often, education for girls is not a priority in Tanzania, and families rely on their daughters to look after the home. Child marriage is common, and there are few choices or opportunities available for girls' secondary education. Even if they gain entry to a government school, the dropout rate is high, usually due to pregnancy or a lack of finances. In a culture where women are not highly respected, even travelling to school, or studying in a co-educational setting, can be unsafe.'

As our Vice Head Prefect – Service said at the end of her presentation at assembly last week:

"Why shouldn't the hundreds of girls and women in Tanzania have the hope that their dreams of receiving a safe education, continuing on to tertiary education and pursuing a career will become a reality – by standing shoulder to shoulder (*Bega kwa Bega*) with Bunda Girls' Secondary School, this can be possible. Young women are empowered, uplifted and encouraged to chase their dreams, action their passions and make something of their abilities. There is HOPE."

After their visit to BGSS, the girls also had the opportunity to go on a phenomenal safari and to visit The School of St Jude. As Mrs Annette Ware writes:

"We received a very warm welcome when we visited the The School of St Jude in Arusha, which Abbotsleigh's Junior School has supported for many years. Following a presentation on the school's history and its commitment to fighting poverty through education, the Abbotsleigh girls were treated to an outdoor chapati cooking class, during which time we were joined by the founder of St Jude's, Australian Gemma Sisia."



Upon returning home, the girls gave a special presentation in our Senior School service assembly, and last Saturday, Nimue Davidson (Year 9) and Bethany Hall (Year 9) spoke beautifully when they were interviewed about their experiences at the Anglican Aid Conference held at Moore College.

I commend to you the presentation by our Vice Head Prefect – Service, Sarah Hooper-Mitchell and our Tanzania Pioneers about the central role service has at our school and some of the girls' learnings from Tanzania.

I would like to thank Dr Alison Gates, Mrs Annette Ware and Rev Sarah Hobba very much for accompanying the girls on their amazing trip, and Rev Helen Hoskins for all that she did, to not only be at BGSS with our group, but also to facilitate and enhance their experiences in so many ways.

Our partnership has flourished over the past two years, with Year 8 sponsoring Elizabeth and Agness, and Year 7 sponsoring Happyness and Nioti. Students and staff across our school have played a role in not only enhancing the quality of education, but also the quality of life for the students and their families at Bunda. On behalf of the Service Council and greater Abbotsleigh community, I thank you for generously giving your time, efforts and resources to further this partnership. For it is through collective engagement and collaboration that this partnership has achieved so much already, and it is through this same spirit of unity that it will continue to grow and thrive in the years to come.

During the recent July holidays, we were blessed that the girls and staff [on stage] were able to travel to Tanzania and witness first-hand how our school's efforts have brought hope to the students and teachers at Bunda School. Today, they will share their experiences, allowing us to hear about the Bunda school community and the impact our partnership has had, and will continue to have on their lives.

Reflections of Bunda Girls' Secondary School

What is a typical school day like?

The girls are up at 5 am for some prep, followed by chores such as sweeping and raking the school

grounds. Morning Parade is at 7.30 am around the flagpole. This includes singing the school song, a devotion and announcements. Their lessons are the same length as ours. They play sport or do other activities in the afternoons before dinner and then do further prep after dinner. They have long days with early starts.

What is Chapel like?

Chapel lasts for about two hours. It is very joyful with lots of enthusiastic unaccompanied singing punctuated with soloists. There is a talk, prayers and communion.

What it is like in the classrooms?

There are about 35 students in each class, and they are very earnest with their studies. Sometimes there is a textbook that can be shared amongst the students, but more often notes are written on a chalkboard by the teacher and recorded meticulously by the girls in their notebooks. Students stand to answer questions and are then applauded by the class. Apart from the science rooms, there are no resources apart from a chalkboard.

What were the dormitories like?

The dormitories are immaculately clean and tidy. There are six girls to each room. Clothes and personal possessions are stored in a metal trunk. They each have a water bucket that they fill from the school's well.
