
'This year's campaign theme is 'Accelerate Action'. What does this mean? Well, according to data from the World

Abbotsleigh International Women's Day Assembly Speech

Good afternoon everybody.

I'm excited to speak to you today on the eve of International Women's Day.

I want to talk about the progress of women's representation in the senior leadership teams in Australia's top companies and encourage you to aim high, collaborate and really lean in to the upper echelons of leadership when you leave school. I'm going to identify the problem, explain why it matters, then talk about the solution and practical ways you can lean in to your careers after school.

I am a member of Chief Executive Women, an organisation whose shared purpose is one of collaboration: 'women leaders empowering all women'. It's a powerful organisation and helps to remove the barriers to women's progression and ensure equal opportunity for prosperity.

CEW has more than 1200 members representing Australia's most senior and distinguished women leaders across business, academia, government, sport, the arts and not-for-profit sectors. Its president is an Abbotsleigh Old Girl, Susan Lloyd-Hurwitz (Turner, 1993). I challenge you to have a look at the criteria for membership and strive to meet them. When you do, get in contact with me and I'll propose you for membership.

First, the problem: Incremental change in women's representation in senior leadership teams in Australia's top companies has come to a halt. In some cases, gender equality is beginning to slide backwards for the first time since the pandemic.

Here are some key statistics for you:

There are 25 women CEOs in the ASX300 Australian companies, down from 26 a year ago:

- 91% of CEOs are still men;
- 20 ASX300 companies have no women in their executive teams;
- Only 27% of ASX300 companies have genderbalanced executive leadership teams;

70% of executive leadership roles are still held by men. Australia is actually a poor performer compared to our global peers. Women's representation on boards is 34% – below New Zealand at 42% and Sweden at 38%. Unfortunately, there has also been a global trend of backlash against equality and diversity initiatives. Gender-based violence has increased by nearly 30% as harmful gender norms remain deeply embedded in our society.

It is all a pretty sober picture.

Second, why it matters: The glacial progress of women in the upper echelons of corporate leadership has negative consequences for Australian business and the economy. Deloitte, a consultancy, found that dismantling prescriptive gender norms and prioritising gender equality could boost Australian GDP by \$128 billion. Closing the gender gap could make the global economy richer by 26%.

This has important real life consequences – fewer women in their 50s and 60s sleeping on the street, young women in Africa having the dignity and selfdetermination that comes from having a job that pays a fair wage, you girls coming back from maternity leave at the same level of seniority and pay as when you left.

Research conducted by BankWest demonstrates that increasing representation of women across each of the key leadership roles in an organisation added market value of between \$52m and \$70m for an averagesized organisation. Having a female CEO leads to a 5% increase in market capitalisation and on average this is worth \$79.6m.

Finally, the solution: Happily, much can be done and progress will be made. Girls, at this stage of your lives, you are ideally positioned to benefit, be the emerging leaders and change Australia for the better.

The evidence is clear: visionary leadership, systemic change and top-level commitments are equality accelerators.

How do you position yourself for the upper echelons of leadership?

- **Be the best:** Be a high-potential woman. The best way to prepare yourself for that now is to work hard at school and take all the opportunities you have to excel, in the classroom, on the sporting field, in drama, music and debating. Get involved and push yourself.
- Believe in yourself and have a go. This is absolutely critical. You must let people know that you have ambition. Put your hand up for more responsibilities and that new job.



- Hard work is crucial. As Taylor Swift said: 'Just focus on the work.' You need structure, you need discipline. Happily, and as Margaret Thatcher said, '[Hard work] is the high road to pride, self-esteem and personal satisfaction.'
- Avoid working part-time: Choose a flexible workplace instead. At every age, less than 50% of women are working full-time and typically make significant and long-term adjustments to their roles. After the age of 35, women are more than twice as likely to be working part-time or casually. Stay fulltime, girls, and demand flexibility to cater to your needs and those of your family.
- **Take a CEO pipeline role**, a profit and loss role: There are a lot of women in human resources and law. These roles aren't usually a road to the top. Think about roles where you manage something that makes money for a business, such as business lending in a bank, growing subscribers in a telco or managing complex engineering projects.
- Get a sponsor: High-potential women who are sponsored by a senior leader are 20% more likely to be promoted. Find one as soon as you enter the workforce and keep developing your sponsors. Start at university! Start now! Ask your family friends or an Abbotsleigh parent for advice. Get them interested in your career. One of my sponsors has been championing me since I was 26 and he just came through for me again late last week.
- Vote with your feet: Work in inclusive, flexible and respectful workplaces. If your workplace is not, move on.
- Build the right support in your home life: This is really important. Marry the right person, someone who will help you and prioritise your career as much as his. My husband and I made the school lunches for the week ahead together on Sundays after we got home from church. My sons do their own

laundry (and still got great ATARs, so you can help at home and still do well!).

• **Collaborate with other women:** Most of my jobs came through my friends, many of them Abbotsleigh Old Girls. One of my first part-time jobs at university was working in the legal department of a large bank. One of my Abbotsleigh friends got me that job, and I got us our next one. In the same way that you help each other now, you will help each other throughout life. I have been helped on many occasions throughout my life by Abbotsleigh Old Girls. There are some lovely stories for another time. I try to give back, too: a young Abbotsleigh Old Girl called me a few years ago and asked my advice as to whether she should accept an offer to study at Oxford. There is only one answer to that question! Then she needed a job to pay for it and I was able to help.

Girls, it is such a delight to see you again. I plan to be here in a few weeks at CRU group and there are lots of exciting events throughout the year that I will be attending. Please come and say hello and tell me what you are enjoying about school.

Girls, lean in, collaborate and change the world!
