Acknowledgement of Country at the Sydney Opera House, 20 May 2025

As a proud Ngemba woman from Bourke, living on Gamilaroi country in Moree and studying on Dharug land, I wish to acknowledge the traditional owners of the Country where we are today.

This point of the harbour is known to the Gadigal people as Tubowgule (tube-uh-gahlee), a Dharug word meaning 'where the knowledge waters meet'.

I wish to acknowledge the traditional owners who have been living in this area for over 60,000 years and who continue to practise their culture and language, and remain as important custodians for this land. These connections to Country are evident in their ceremonies, the natural landmarks, their sacred objects, the waterways and the storytelling.

Like traditions in our school community, developed over 140 years, our traditions are passed down from generation to generation, sharing the knowledge and wisdoms learned. It is our responsibility to honour this wisdom and draw from it to reach a point of reconciliation.

This week, our school community is connected and united as we join with our nation in marking National Reconciliation Week – a time to reflect, learn and look to the future together.

The dates for National Reconciliation Week remain the same each year – 27 May to 3 June. The day prior to Reconciliation Week, 26 May, is National Sorry Day, and Reconciliation Week itself is bookended by two significant anniversaries – 27 May, the anniversary of the 1967 Referendum, Australia's most successful referendum which saw more than 90% of Australians vote 'Yes' to count

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people in the census, and 3 June, the anniversary of the historic Mabo decision, which overturned the 'fiction of terra nullius' and paved the way for Land Rights for First Nations people. Some also may remember the incredible bridge walk on 28 May 2000 which brought people from all over Australia together to participate in a 'historic walk in support of reconciliation and Indigenous rights.'

In the Senior School, the week commenced with a moving and meaningful experience as a group of our senior girls attended the National Sorry Day Service at Roseville College. This important event provided a poignant foundation for the week's activities and reminded us of the enduring importance of truth-telling and acknowledgement. Also on Monday, a number of our Year 4 girls represented Abbotsleigh at Wahroonga Park creating sand art alongside internationally renowned Aboriginal artist, Walangari Karntawarra.

Throughout the week, Junior School girls have been wearing bandanas and scrunchies with designs by First Nations artists, or ribbons reflecting the colours of the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander flags, as well as undertaking activities in their classes. Special highlights have included the opportunity for our Year 3 girls to connect virtually with First Nations educators to learn about Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander language groups, The Dreaming, family structure, and tools and technologies; and our Year 4 girls engaging in art making to create stories using symbols for a man, woman and child, the land, as well as numerous animals, in an 'Aboriginal Storytelling Through Art' incursion.

Continuing our commitment to recognition and respect, a





group of senior girls, accompanied by our Coordinator of First Nations Students and Programs, Mrs Shane Hamilton, attended the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Veterans Commemoration Service at the Anzac Memorial in Hyde Park today. This special service honoured the contribution and sacrifice of First Nations service members and deepened our students' understanding of the history and service of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples in Australia's defence forces.

Looking ahead to the weekend, our firsts football team will be proudly participating in the First Nations Round of Sport, playing against Pymble Ladies' College this Saturday. Our players will wear a striking First Nations Round jersey, designed by Tiarna Herczeg (Kuku Yalanji), as part of our First Nations Artist Exchange Program. Tiarna worked closely with our First Nations students in the creative process, making the jersey not just a uniform, but a powerful symbol of culture, identity and collaboration.

As several Senior School year groups are away this week on excursions and camps, and Year 12 girls are undertaking assessments, we will formally mark Reconciliation Week as a Senior School community during a special assembly on Tuesday. We are delighted to welcome back Lowana Grant (AOG 2004), a proud First Nations woman who will be our guest speaker. Lowana's insights and experiences promise to be inspiring as we continue to reflect on what reconciliation means in our school and wider community.

The 2025 Reconciliation Week theme, 'Bridging Now to Next' invites all Australians to draw on the lessons of the past as we work towards a more inclusive and respectful future.

Indeed, as Myffy Wilson (Year 12) so eloquently stated in her Acknowledgement of Country at the Sydney Opera House last week, just as we honour and pass down the 140 year old traditions of our school, it is the responsibility of all of us to honour the wisdom of 60,000 years of tradition and wisdom, and 'to draw from it to reach a point of reconciliation'.
